A Very Slow Process

It used to take at least two days for a message to be delivered

Anything a child had to say would usually wait until the next day-cooling off period

Communication Was Expensive And Limited

Internet Dial Up Access was available but very costly

Some Internet Relay Chats (IRCs) were gaining popularity but still not well known

Government, universities and other institutions used "the web" mainly for file transfers and simple database access

Some Stats:


In 2015, 94 percent of children ages 3 to 18 had a computer at home and 61 percent of children ages 3 to 18 had internet access at home.

For those children who had access to the Internet in 2015, the two locations with the highest reported levels of internet access were at home (86 percent) and at school (65 percent), and the two most common means of internet access at home were a high-speed internet service and a mobile internet service or data plan.

More Statistics

95% of teens report they have a smartphone or access to one

Favorite Sites/Apps



Cyberbullying

43% of kids have been bullied online

70% of students report seeing frequent bullying online

80% of teens use a cell phone regularly, making it the most common medium for cyber bullying

81% of young people think bullying online is easier to get away with than bullying in person

Bullying victims are 2 to 9 times more likely to consider committing suicide

75% of students admit they have visited a website bashing another student

What Can You Do?

Parental Controls:

- iPhones and iPads
- Samsung/Android phones

Talk to your child about cell phone safety

Discuss how despite what the app says, no photo, video, or text disappears completely

Add your child's phone/tablet to your iCloud or Playstore account

Educate yourself

What Can You Do?

Explore the App or Google Play Store Know what's available to your child

Block messaging or set data limits

Talk to your cell phone or ISP provider about parental options or controls available to you

Make a contract with your child and set rules and parameters. If those rules are broken, then live by the contract

Enforce consequences-They will thank you later...much later
