Children and Death

How to talk to a child about death

- Encourage the child to talk openly about feelings
- Allow expression of feelings
- Support expression of emotions appropriate to grief and death
- Help children deal with their feelings and emotions

Telling a child about a loss

- -First thing, to communicate through touch
 - -arm around child
 - -sit close to child
 - -hold on lap
 - -hold hands
- -Talk about things the child has experienced or noticed already
 - -pregnancy
 - -father and/or mother crying, worried, sad
 - -mother in hospital
- -Encourage/allow child to ask questions
- -Include adult reality
- -Tell child what to expect
- -Strengthen positive memories
- -Acknowledge and share your feelings
- -Explain death in an understandable manner (simply and honestly)
- -When appropriate, let child make the decision to attend/not attend the funeral

Children with unmet needs might:

- -regress
- -develop somatic symptoms
- -fear impending death
- -express anxiety in their behavior

Visible reactions of children

(positive and negative behaviors can increase)

- -anxiety attacks
- -bed wetting
- -nightmares
- -upsurge of aggressiveness
- -stuttering
- -running away
- -death phobias
- -separation anxiety
- -sudden outburst of fear and hatred of the mother
- -suicide attempts
- -more loving, concerned, cuddly
- -more attentive to parents'/siblings' needs
- -fearful, angry, withdrawn

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
